It was agreed that the matter be deferred for the time being and that in the meantime the Chairman would discuss the matter with Chesterton Rural District Council. Regarding the fencing of the opposite side of the ditch, the Clerk reported that the County Council considered that expense on additional fencing was not justifiable.
