Highway & Road Safety Matters

1809

Traffic Dangers near the School

The Clerk reported that the County Road Safety Officer told him the Dept. of Environment had first to approve the new type of "Keep Clear" road markings which would then be marked out in front of Milton School. A message was then to be circulated, via the Schools, to all parents from the Chief Constable.

1810

Suggested Closure of Arbury Road

The Clerk said there had been a suggestion (seen in the Press) from Arbury Road residents that this road be closed to through traffic. Histon & Impington Parish Councils were objecting through the R.D.C. & the Parish Councils Association & had sought the views of this Council. The Clerk said he had replied that he thought this council would object to any scheme causing increase in traffic through Milton, particularly along Bull Lane to the dangerous junction with the A 10. The Council supported this action.

1811

Fouling of footpaths

A complaint had been received by Mrs Jones from Miss Chidlow about the disgusting fouling of footpaths by dogs in Milton. The Clerk had made enquiries; the Public Health Dept. advised that a public notice would have no legal force behind it; the Police advise that it is not an offence in the County (as it is in the City) for a dog on a lead to foul the highway. No offence is committed by a dog not on a lead of fouling the footpath in either City or County.

1816

Waste Land, Boles R. (1786) - The Clerk told the meeting that the Official Receiver for Messrs Gray, Conoley, (in liquidation) had agreed

(1816)	that the Parish Council be ceded the pieces of land in question on payment of legal costs.
	Negotiations were now proceeding between the Receivers & the Parish Council about the status of a remaining piece of land on the north-east corner of the Gray Copley estate.
1817.	Possible uses of the first piece of land when obtained were discussed. A parishioner suggested a footpath be made as an amenity.
1818	<u>Street lamp near Rec. A.D. entrance</u>
	Mr. Patten said that the lamp erected by the County Council was hardly near enough to the Hall entrance.
1819	<u>Request for street sign to Village Hall</u>
	The Clerk said the Highways Dept. told him that a Ministry of Transport ruling prevented such a sign on the main A. 10.
	Mr. Patten re-affirmed the necessity of the sign as there were now two "Merton Halls" in the village, & many patrons of events in the Hall were not local residents.
	Mr. Nurse suggested the sign could be placed in Coles Rd. - and visible from the main road.
	The Clerk said he would approach the Highways Dept. again with these two points.
1820	<u>Camborne Rd., Council House gardens & Rec. A.D. fencing</u>
	Mr. Patten drew attention to the present position. He said there was now no boundary at all between the ground & the gardens & that tenants were bewildered by the continuing indecision about the rear halves of their gardens still staked out, after some years, for garages & houses; he alleged they received contradictory letters from time to time about cultivating these parts of their gardens.
	The Clerk reminded the meeting that a Ministry of Health decision had prevented the R.D.C. from building the elderly persons' housing as planned near the Rec. A.D. The land had been left marked out with a view to building garages. The Parish Council had learned only an hour before this meeting that R.D.C. policy now favoured hard-standing instead of garages.
	A parishioner pointed out the importance of a definite boundary to the Rec. A.D. as insurance claims for injury on the C.R.D. could arise. At present it was a "no-mans-land" which an insurance company might dispute if a claim arose.
	The Clerk said he would again write to the R.D.C. with the foregoing points on behalf of parishioners & tenants.
1820	<u>Public Toilets</u>
	The urgent need for these was stressed by several parishioners who

(1820) alleged the present arrangements were unhealthy. Others pointed out that the Village Hall toilets were available & keys available to the two sports clubs.

The Clerk said he had been corresponding since 1966 with the R.D.C. on this matter; toilets had been promised but successive Government economic restrictions had prevented them being built; the R.D.C. had, in fact, in January 1967, got as far as publishing the Statutory Notice of intention to build them, on a site near the Village Hall.

It was proposed by Mr. Sanford, secy Mr. Brooklyn that the R.D.C. be asked for a firm date of commencement of work on Public Toilets.

1821

Provisional Parish Council Accounts for y.e. March 31st 1971

made up to March 2nd 1971, & circulated at Meeting

The Village Hall & Rec'd. ac showed a deficit of £553.0.11. (£553.05), after paying 1½^d rate to the V.H. Comm. & a contribution to cost of fencing & piping of ditch.

Smallholders ac showed credit of £3.55 (£3.25).

After carrying the balance from these to General of the Parish Council had a balance in hand on March 2nd of £534.13.1 (£534.65).

The sum of £850 had been precepted for 1971/72.

1822

Parish Council Accounts for y.e. March 31st 1970

Mr. Summersfield asked if the final accounts for previous year (e.g. to March 31st 1970) could be given at the Annual Parish Meeting.

The Clerk said he had not done so as those for last year had been asked for provisionally at the 1970 Meeting. He would do so in future, as of course, (as he agreed) they would not have been formally passed.

Mr. Summersfield proposed, Mrs. Jones seconded that the Accounts for 1970 be accepted. This was agreed.

1823

Parochial Churches Accounts for y.e. December 31st 1970 & circulated at Meeting

Of income of £192, the sum of £180 had been distributed according to the Scheme, including £85 on Coal & groceries in the Village, at Christmas. Total balance in hand £12.11.7.

1824

Report of County Councillor, Dr. H. Hatley.

Dr. Hatley said that Local government reform was foremost, due to the Maud report, and would shortly be discussed by the County Council.

(1824)

Social services were now wide-ranging & diverse Welfare Services included Children's Depts; Child minders & Mental Health.

Dr Hatley favoured fluoridation of piped water supplies now approved by the County Council. Some local authorities were against it; some people considered it "enforced medication" and disagreed. Dental Associations approved. Alternatively, tablets taken in milk by young children had been suggested. Fluoride prevented dental decay at an early age & helped bone formation.

School meal prices & home-help services were increased but still subsidised by the Rates.

Northern By-Pas draft plans, which would affect Milton & a public inquiry into Cambridge By-pas roads were expected soon. Such roads cost some £800,000 a mile.

School safety. The flashing amber discs on either side of school crossings had now been erected in Milton — one of the only 4 in the County. A new form of "Keep Clear" sign on the roadway outside Schools had been approved by the Min. of Environment. At Milton the problem was Parents' cars causing obstruction outside the School. He suggested that Parents might share cars to take children to & from School. At Impington College pre-driving training courses were being given to seniors.

Mrs Jones asked Dr. Hatley about fluoridation costs per head of population & considered fluoridation of water supplies a wasteful method.

1825

Report of Chairman of Village Hall Committee - Mr. J. Jenkins

Mr. Jenkins reported another successful year financially & socially. The adoption of a single "Sub-Committee" was a successful one. The extension, tender for which had been accepted in October, was nearing completion and the entire cost will be borne by the Village Hall Committee. So far, social activities had shown a profit of £438.

Mrs Jones thanked the Committee, on behalf of the Parish Council, for all the work in getting the extension realised.

1826

Report of Milton Parochial School Manager - Mr. P. Kiddle

Mr. Kiddle said increase in the Roll continued: it was now 228 — a manageable figure, but expansion problems

(1826)

were still close. It had been a very busy year in which the extension had been completed giving first claim to a new library, a Head Master's Study, and extra toilet facilities. Playground & playing fields areas had been increased. He wished to record appreciation of the way in which the Head Master & Staff had borne the up-keep of the building programme.

Traffic dangers had increased to children going to & from school. The Managers felt that parents parking immediately outside did not help as it obscured the road for children. They were very concerned about this.

Academically, it had been an extremely good year, for which thanks were due to the Staff - it was not necessarily automatic! Milton School standards were one of the highest in the County. A good relationship with the Warden of Dymbyton was maintained.

Outside activities, coach trips, museums, historic places, etc. had been paid for from the "School Fund" to which sole proceeds had contributed £100. In the Inter-School area sports, of 33 events, Milton got 32 firsts & 1 second.

1827

Report of Rural District Councillor - Mr. K.P. Humphries

Mr Humphries thanked all those who had supported his nomination at the recent by-election as recently as mid-January.

The 12 flats for the elderly, in Walkley Way (named in honour of the retired Councillor who had served the village some 42 years.) were nearing completion after delays. The first 4 had all been allocated to Milton residents, hoping to move in by May. He recommended the Meeting that The District Rate Fund & Government subsidies paid for the building and any deserving person(s) in the Rural District were quite eligible. There were also 18 ^{flats} at Combeaton & 12 at Coton nearing completion.

~~Subsidising the services where necessary was being considered.~~

A suggestion to close Arbury Rd to through traffic was to be opposed by the ^{District} Council on behalf of several villages. This could affect Milton adversely by bringing more traffic through, especially past the School. He understood the Rural Council would support objection.

The Rate Collection procedure had been revised. Notices were made with a single demand note, early in the year, without

(1827)

further reminder will be followed by summonses and the revised procedure will be to issue half-yearly reminders & allow 7 days before any summons is issued.

In Local Govt. reform the District Council are opposing the suggestion of very large Counties and putting forward smaller alternatives.

The new arrangement of plastic sacks for refuse collection is working satisfactorily but some problems arise in distributing enough sacks for householders whose needs vary. The expensive system of inserting request cards in each pack may be modified.

Mr Humphries drew attention to the ever-present rises in costs & rates. Total District expenditure for 1971/72 is estimated at £597,000 - to meet which increase of 4½D in the £ is necessary to $4\frac{1}{2} \times 21np = 21np$. This was an increase of 51% in the District Rates since 1967.

Any Other Business

1828

Mr E.C. Day, complained of the state of road & pavement near 23 & 25 Butt Lane, which had been complained of at previous Parish Meetings.

The Clerk agreed the complaints were long-standing & said he had written several times to the Highway Dept. without effect. Mr Day maintained ineffective repairs had been attempted but the nuisance of standing puddles blocking entrances & pathway remained.

1829

Several electors repeated their dissatisfaction with the District & County Councils over the matters of providing Toilets, fencing the Rec.Gr. & trees on the Winship Estate & after lively discussion the following Resolution was proposed by Mr E. Duller & seconded by Mr G. Patten:

Milton Parish Meeting wishes to place on record its loss of faith in the empty promises and inaction on the part of Chertsey Rural District Council & the Dams. & the Ely County Council in relation to serious amenity problems in the Village. The meeting would like to invite the M.P. for Cambridgeshire, Mr Lynn MC.M.P., the Chairman of the County Council, & the Chairman of the District Council to visit the village & personally investigate the complaints of the villagers with the Chairman of Milton Parish Council.

This was carried by 11 votes to 4, with ~~2~~ abstentions.

1830 Mrs B. Watson asked if a road-sweeper could be provided to supplement the mechanical sweeper.

1831. Protest about Rate increases: The Clerk read a letter sent to the Chairman of the Parish Council, by Miss C. W. Hudson, of 58, Ten R^o in which she regretted she was unable to be present to protest personally against "the proposed steep rise in R.D.C. rates"

This concluded the business & the Chairman closed the Meeting

1832 Parish Meeting Resolution of March 2nd (1829).

The main business was to discuss instructions for the Clerk concerning this Resolution.

The Clerk said he would of course, as Clerk to that Meeting, be forwarding the Resolution as instructed (to Mr Pym & the two Chairmen).

After full discussion the Clerk was instructed also to write to those 3 gentlemen from Parish Council as follows:

That the Parish Council consider the wording of the Resolution unfortunate; That they are basically in agreement with the Parish Meeting but believe all promises to have been in good faith; That they appreciate the concern of parishioners & also that there are appropriate channels through which they have been following up the complaints. Under no circumstances did the Parish Council wish to undermine the good working relationship built up over the years between them and the two Councils.

They wished the Clerk to comment as follows:

(1832)

(a) Public Toilets

Correspondence since 1966. Waited for a definite commitment as soon as possible based on the latest information that toilets are to be considered "not June or July".

(b) Fences & Garages

They only learnt that garages were to be dropped at their Council meeting an hour before the Annual Parish Meeting. They suggested, separately, they wish for hard-standing or a hard road giving access to rear of Council House gardens and opportunity for tenants to park at the rear of their gardens. They hope this will clear up the indecision to which tenants are now subjected about cultivating the rears of their gardens - shall staked out after many years for housing or garages. Suggest fencing of Rec'dt/Council gardens boundary can now be carried out.

(c) Wimship Estate Trees (1815)

The Parish Council had written to the Planning Officer suggesting early tree planting as a condition of permission for development. Had this been done the present position on the Estate could not have arisen. The Council understands instructions to plant trees have been given to the Estate during development.

The Clerk was also instructed to make further attempts to obtain more information about the promised tree planting from the Wimship Estate Agents, Messrs Gray, Swann & Cook.

Any Other Business

1833

The Clerk read a letter asking for the Parish Council's views on Car Parking. Agreed that there were offered in the negotiations procedure.

1834

Northern By-Pass - Boston Road Construction Unit

This Unit applied to place markers for aerial survey on the Council allotments. Proposed by Mr. Foster, secy. of the Sunnifield permanent, Mr. Barnabas Shipp's Centenary

1835

In view of Mr. Shipp's long-service to the Parish as roadman it was proposed by Mr. Jones, seconded by Mr. Kiddle that a 100th birthday card signed by all the Council & a present of wine be made by the Chairman. This was agreed unanimously & a tribute paid to his excellent work. The Clerk had informed H.M. the Queen & also "Cape Grace, for Centenaries" scheme.

1836

White Horse Car Parking

The Clerk said that complaints of obstruction of the footpath here had been passed to the licensee who willingly agreed to tell his clients.

1837

Resignation of Mr J.W.R. Lewis

The Council received this with much regret. Mr. Lewis was shortly to leave the village.
