17 To Receive County Councillor's Report (Full report Appendix 1 on MPC website) Work in the Committees:

Strategy and Resources: No additional funding has been offered to Cambridgeshire County Council in the government's autumn statement, despite the funding crisis faced by all local authorities, rising inflation and increasing levels of need. Proposals for Cambridgeshire County Council's 2024/5 budget and five-year business plan are set to be presented to its Strategy, Resources and Performance Committee on 19 December, the same day the Government is likely to unveil the full detail of its Local Government Financial Settlement. **Not just Cambridgeshire:** There is general concern among County Councils across the country that even 'well-managed' councils will be unable to avoid insolvency in years to come. The County Councils Network (CCN) says that with increasing demand for care services, especially for vulnerable children, costs are outstripping resources. Nationally, £319 million of the projected £639 million overspend by county councils this year comes from children's services. One in ten 'well-managed' councils are unsure if they will be able to balance their budget this year (a legal requirement). This figure is expected to rise to four in ten for 2024/25. The overall budget deficit is expected to reach £4 billion up to 2026, even though councils are planning over £2billion of savings and cuts in order to avoid Section 114 notices being issued (the local government equivalent of bankruptcy).

Assets and Procurement

Shire Hall, Cambridge to be re-marketed: The County Council will soon be seeking a new commercial partner to redevelop the former Shire Hall building in Cambridge. All proposals for the site will require full planning, Listed Building and Scheduled Ancient Monument consents, and ensure protection of the assets on site.

New Environment Minister: Cllr Dupre pointed out the local challenges of flooding in the north and shortage of water in the south of the county, the need to get 25,000 homes off oil boilers, reducing carbon emissions from peatland, public transport and roads.

Highways and Transport

Street Lights – switching to more efficient LEDs: This work will run from 2024 to 2026 and will replace 47,500 street lights with LED lanterns.

Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Combined Authority: The Code of Conduct complaint against Mayor Nik Johnson has now been adjudicated by the Combined Authority's Audit & Governance Sub-Committee. The Mayor was found to have breached the Code on two counts—civility and disrepute, the latter brought upon himself. He was asked to issue an apology and to undertake appropriate training.

18 To Receive District Councillors Report

Civil Parking Enforcement: New Civil Parking Enforcement (CPE) powers in South Cambridgeshire will be given to Cambridgeshire County Council following a decision by Parliament. Earlier this year an application was submitted to the Department for Transport (DfT) to enable Council Civil Enforcement Officers (CEOs) to issue Penalty Charge Notices for the majority of on-street offences such as parking on double or single yellow lines. Previously only the Police could do this. Highways officers have worked closely with South Cambridgeshire District Council on the development of the scheme.

A Warning Notice will be issued to people who continue to park where there are restrictions throughout January – this looks like a parking ticket but there is no fine attached. Penalty Charge Notices will be issued from 1 February which will mean a fine of between £50 and £70, depending on the severity of the offence.

Waterbeach Greenway: The Waterbeach Greenway consultation closes on Friday 8 December.

Gypsy & Traveller Accommodation Needs Assessment – request sent to Parish Councils: A survey consultancy company, Arc4, has been appointed by SCDC to undertake a Gypsy & Traveller Accommodation Needs Assessment. As part of the Assessment, SCDC has contacted all Parish Councils as key stakeholders to ask them to participate in a survey. The Assessment will help to inform the joint Local Plan and help the Council plan for any future need identified. The consultants are also undertaking fieldwork with the Gypsy & Traveller Community to ascertain their views and future accommodation needs. It is a statutory requirement that councils undertake an assessment and the Council is on track to have this work completed by early next year.

Christmas Market: South Cambridgeshire District Council will be hosting a Christmas Market on Sunday 10 December which will be held across Cambourne Village College Performance Hall and the neighbouring gymnasium. Visitor entry to the market is free.

Four-day week trial update: An Extraordinary Council Meeting was held on Monday 20 Nov to discuss the Best Value Notice issued to the Council by the Government. Members voted to note the report and agree that the Council engage with DLUHC to provide the data requested. The first weekly report to DLUCH has been sent and Officers are continuing to gather the data requested for the weekly and retrospective returns.

Central Government subsidy of bus fares: The bus fare cap (£2 – single fare) in England has been extended by government to the end of 2024.

Homes for Ukraine update: The Council continues to support hosts, community coordinators and Parish Council colleagues and has partnered with Refugee Host Support who offer a 24/7 service, 7 days a week. The Council recognizes that hosts may need specific and professional advice, which is what this service provides, along with language and digital lessons for Ukrainian guests, as well support for families with young children, including a clothing exchange. Help is being offered towards finding employment for those aged 15-24.

19 To Receive Milton Community Centre Report

Maintenance/Improvements: General ongoing repairs have been completed across the 3 sites.

Pot holes at the Sycamores are being filled in on a regular basis however the area just outside the entrance on the path and road has become very enlarged when it rains.

The lights on the 5 a side court have been changed to LED lamps and all lights in the main building are now LED.

Bookings: The Annexe and the Main Hall remain popular for children's parties and the Main Building is now in use 7 days a-week for regular bookings. We have seen an increase in demand for weekday evening bookings for exercise classes.

Hard Courts: The Hard Courts are in use 7 days a week and Milton Colts have resumed their winter booking on the 5 aside court. Milton Tennis Club continue to use the 3 courts.

Youth Building and Sycamores Pavilion: Eddies Artworks continue to use the building Monday to Friday and Youth Group on a Thursday evening.

Milton football club continue to use the Pavilion.

North Lodge: We still see very low interest in hiring the facility due to the main room being too small for exercise classes and the flooring not suitable for dance classes.

We have recently had a pre-school cooking workshop however due to low participant attendance this may not continue.

Milton Colts and Milton Cricket are still the main users of the facility.

Vandalism and Crime: We have had several instances of damage being caused to football pitches at all 3 sites by quad bikes, motorcycles or eBikes being ridden over them and doing spins and skids. The damage has been reported to the police and photos of individuals concerned however no further action has been taken and the cases filed.

We continue to receive complaints about dog owners not clearing up dog mess and not having dogs on leads, ignoring the signs regarding this particularly at Coles Road and the Sycamores.

We have had reports of anti-social behavior at the Sycamores Rec with glass bottles smashed on the 5 a side court on a few occasions.

I hope this email goes some way in helping the parish council understand the Quote for your next parish meeting on the 18/12/2023., In respect of the village sign. The breakdown of the Quote is self-explanatory apart from the Cambridge restoration £4440 . which seems to have caused a little confusion.

Oak: Materials: Scaffold platform Cambridge Restoration:

£1214.91 £605 £200 £4440

Total: £6459.91 + VAT

The oak being used is joinery grade because it doesn't shrink or crack as opposed to "green oak" which can.

The amount of £4440 covers

Labour

- 5 days to work on top half of the sign
- 6 days to work on the bottom half of the post

 The majority of work will have to be carried out in twos for health and safety reasons, lifting and handling of heavy objects safe erection of towers etc]

This comes to 22 days at £180 =£3,960

The remainder is A Small profit for the best part of one month's work and commitment. As a small builder and oak framer Me and my associate Mr M Dyer we cannot afford to underestimate the work involved in restoring your village sign. This would be unprofessional of us and doesn't treat your village with the respect it deserves.

The work at First glance looks straight forward, but as you start to look at the list below we hope the parish council realizes there are many factors which have cost implications which are unclear at this time.

- Instead of trying to fix the top part of the sign in situ ,we are going to remove the top part and restore it in Wicken. This has more costs but would cause least disruption to locals and takes the temptation away from lead thieves.
- The frame around the Milton sign is weather damaged, this damage is hard to price due to the height at which it hangs currently.
- The mounting at the top of the post may need repairing, until we take the top off we can't see. There is a split at the top of the post which could be a natural split and has no structural implications or it may not. [sign and frame with lock keys]
- The bottom of the post has four large paving slabs and four small slabs. These are causing the rain to splash back on to the post and need removing. There appears to be a plastic cover which is wrapped around the bottom of the post, which I think was put in to protect the timber. This is now having the opposite effect and is holding moisture against it. This plastic needs to be removed but its depth and how its fix is unclear
- The damage to the bottom of the post varies around 35mm deep in places this could be more when we start splicing. It is possible the damage is contained to just the surface area. This can not be guaranteed until work has started
- Only one face of the post can fixed safely at a time

To clarify the work we are Quoting

- Carefully remove the top of the village sign restore and fit new lead this may include a new surround for the sign
- Inspect the top of the post repair as necessary
- Attach temporary brace

- Remove paving slabs
- Dig plastic out
- Fix new oak splices
- Back fill with type 1 hard core
- Weed membrane around edge
- Edge with boundary and new stones
- Bring top part back fix
- Light sand
- Take photos of the restoration as we go

In conclusion we have tried to include enough time for all eventualities .

I would also like to point out that the last two joinery companies that have not responded back to you may have thought the same, that this is hard to price and not worth the risk.

Highways – Forthcoming roadworks

Horningsea - ST JOHNS LANE HORNINGSEA Road closure 02/01/2024 - 01/03/2024 Highway improvement works CL900SCHEMES-HIGH-ST-H-1 Footway repairs. Horningsea residents are looking forward to speed reduction measures to be installed along the High Street, providing they don't block access to driveways. Following discussions with the parish Chair and residents I have been asking for consideration to be given to making all roads adjoining the High Street to be made 20 mph. Returning to a 30 mph limit in Dock Lane and St Johns Lane seems mad, bad and dangerous - and has spawned a forest of poles (for the 30 mph signs). I have asked officers to meet with the parish council to explain their plans. Waterbeach

NETWORK RAIL BURGESS DROVE WATERBEACH Road closure overnight 06/01/2024 to 06/01/2024 Works for Rail Purposes KL736BGK-61-20-060124

Milton - Junction 33 interchange - I have reported the new potholes which have opened up on the southbound overbridge since the recent re-surfacing (Nov/Dec 2023). Temporary repairs have been done but I hope more permanent finishing will be done soon.

Fen Ditton - Pavement outside 25 High Ditch Road – Following a site visit 7 August 2023 with the Local Highway Officer, the LHO said he would get a quote for works. I am seeking an update 14 December 2023.

Church Street / Green End pavement – on the same site visit we examined the areas of footway that need to be surfaced. Only the section outside the Kings Head was repaired. Latest update - I have requested an update 14 December 2023

Work in the Committees:

Full Council, 12 December 2023

Five motions were debated at the Cambridgeshire County Council full council meeting on 12 December. Four were passed:

- 1. Noting the crisis in adult social care caused by chronic Government underfunding to councils, and asking officers to be ready to take advantage of any future change in Government policies.
- **2.** Asking the council's Communities, Social Mobility & Inclusion Committee to consider actions to ensure a more diverse council.
- **3.** Expressing concern at the lack of availability of NHS dentistry, particularly for our Children in Care and committing to take action to address the problem.
- **4.** Welcoming options for more flexible working, and committing to promote these within the council and among local employers.

County Planning

County planners have received funding of £368,000 to help respond to proposals for major infrastructure in Cambridgeshire, following successful bids for funding from central government.

The monies will help support Cambridgeshire County Council with the administration of Development Consent Orders (DCO) for schemes like East West Rail, the A428 Black Cat to Caxton Gibbet upgrade and Fenland Reservoir, as well as others known as Nationally Important Infrastructure Projects (NSIPs) like the Wastewater Treatment Centre Relocation. The funding award comes following representations from the County Council to the Department for Levelling Up, Housing, and Communities (DLUHC) highlighting the

importance of supporting local authorities, as Councils like Cambridgeshire face increasing numbers of these complex schemes, which are put forward by both developers and central government.

Reponse to government 'Cambridge 2040' vision.

The Rt Hon Michael Gove, Secretary of State for Levelling Up, Housing & Communities, unveiled updated plans for the Government's 'Cambridge 2040' vision on Tuesday 19 December 2023. This plan envisages over 150,000 new homes around Cambridge as part of a major new expansion of the city.

The leaders of Cambridge City Council, South Cambridgeshire District Council, Cambridgeshire County Council, and the Mayor of Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Combined Authority, said:

"Despite working hard to engage constructively with Government officials since the Secretary of State's initial Cambridge 2040 announcement in the summer, it's deeply disappointing that once again Government plans for Cambridge seem to be being negotiated through the press.

We note in the latest announcement that the number of new homes put forward by Rt Hon Michael Gove MP has come down from 250,000 to 150,000, but this is still substantially more than the over 50,000 homes we have identified as needed in the emerging Greater Cambridge Local Plan (to 2040) - a number which will already be incredibly challenging to bring forward. We are ambitious for high quality sustainable, green growth but can't stress enough how vital it is that Government supports us to tackle the issues that will otherwise act as roadblocks to sustainable growth.

We have written to the Secretary of State a number of times over the past month to stress the importance of committing to sustainable growth, and to reiterate the support that is needed to enable us to plan for the homes set out in the emerging Greater Cambridge Local Plan.

This includes prioritising sustainable public transport, community infrastructure such as schools and GPs, and water shortages in this region, which are putting our chalk streams under extreme pressure - an issue which the Greater Cambridge Planning Service warned in January 2023 could delay existing plans for housebuilding if not addressed by Government. We are still waiting for responses to these questions which would detail how Government proposes to support us in delivering a proposed 50,000 or so homes responsibly, let alone 150,000.

Clarity is also needed as to who is involved in the 'Cambridge Delivery Group', what it will do, and how it will be governed. Devolution works best when local politicians are empowered to lead and deliver sustainable development and we will continue to work hard to represent our residents and ensure that Cambridge and its surrounding villages grow in a sustainable and carefully planned way."

Following a visit to Cambridge by the Secretary of State in November, leaders from Cambridgeshire County, Cambridge City and South Cambridgeshire District councils, the Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Combined Authority, the Greater Cambridge Partnership, and local business wrote to urge Government to make a number of commitments, including water supply and transport, necessary to support sustainable growth in the area.

Council Budget Consultation

Consultation is to begin on the council's proposals for its 2024/5 budget, in what is being called 'the toughest year to set a balanced council budget'.

The Government's one-year Local Government Financial Settlement announced last month does not compensate for the levels of demand and inflation the council faces, particularly in children's social care, home to school transport and provision for children and young people with special educational needs or disabilities. A fair funding review for local councils promised by the Government has never materialised. As a result all local authorities face significant financial uncertainties. The council proposes a council tax rise of 4.99 per cent (two per cent for adult social care services, and 2.99 per cent for general services) and aims to cover a remaining £2 million gap. A final budget recommendation will be considered at Strategy, Resources and Performance Cttee before being debated at Full Council in Feb. The Council aims to support social services, continue to provide free school meals vouchers for children during holidays, pay the Real Living Wage to those providing adult social care and prioritise highway and cycleway maintenance. Potential savings have been identified:

- Changing to LED streetlights (£1m energy savings each year)
- Rationalising office accommodation (saving £1.5 million over 3 years)
- Reviewing highest cost children's placements and home to school transport (>£2 million)
 I am seeking to ensure we retain the school bus from Milton to Impington VC.
- Driving down bad debt (£0.5 million)
- Reviewing income from permits and parking charges (Just under £1 million)

Adults and Health

Covid-19 Like others, I had Covid (again) before Christmas. Thanks to vaccination, most of us have not suffered too badly and my GP surgery advised me no testing was necessary and to view it like flu. Others have been very poorly with recurring waves of illness. So please be aware of your symptoms and be mindful of those who might unexpectedly suffer more severely than yourself, since our responses seem so variable.

Preventing falls

Falls are a major cause of disability and injury-related death in people aged 75 and over, and have a large impact on quality of life. As our population ages, this will become even more of an issue. Around one in three people over 65 years old and half of those over 80 experience a fall at least once a year. In Cambridgeshire and Peterborough in 2022/23, there were 2,699 emergency admissions due to falls and 1,015 admissions due to a hip fracture. The estimated combined total cost of these hospital admissions was £16.3 million, an increase of over £1.9 million on the previous year.

Cambridgeshire County Council's Adults and Health Committee has endorsed a three-year Falls Prevention Strategy and detailed delivery plan, working with the Cam & Pet Falls Prevention Strategy Group. The aim is to reduce the number of hip fracture admissions, and to improve the quality of life of those who experience a fall or fracture.

Communities, Social Mobility and Inclusion Committee

Holiday Voucher Scheme

The supermarket voucher scheme continued to operate over this Christmas school holiday for all eligible families in Cambridgeshire. Cambridgeshire County Council is running the

scheme until the February 2024 half term using the Household Support Fund from the Department for Work and Pensions and additional funding provided by the Council. Eligible families are automatically emailed vouchers which can be used at a choice of 10 supermarkets. The voucher scheme has been a huge success since it was introduced and appreciated keenly by families struggling in the current financial climate.

In addition to the holiday voucher scheme, there is further support available in response to the cost of living, which can be found here: <u>Support with the cost of living - Cambridgeshire County Council</u>

Libraries offer a helping hand to stay connected this winter

A successful pilot scheme offering free mobile SIM cards to those unable to afford internet access is now available in eleven of Cambridgeshire's libraries. Cambridgeshire Libraries have signed up to the National Databank, an initiative run by Good Things Foundation which provides free mobile SIM cards to anyone over the age of 18 who is on a low income.

Environment and Green Investment Committee

Cambridgeshire residents who wish to use Royston Household Recycling Centre in Hertfordshire will now need to apply for a digital permit. Hertfordshire County Council announced last year it would be restricting access to non-residents at Hertfordshire's network of sixteen recycling centres.

However, the county council has reached an agreement with HCC that enables continued cross-border access to Royston HRC for Cambridgeshire residents living close to the county boundary, whilst allowing Hertfordshire residents to use Thriplow HRC in South Cambs. Resident-only policies are becoming increasingly common across the region and indeed the country, with many neighbouring counties having had this policy in place for some time.

Highways and Transport

20mph speed limit for Ely approved A city-wide 20 mph zone for Ely has been approved following a consultation and a Traffic Regulation Order (TRO) process.

Electric vehicle charging

An estimated 10,000 public electric vehicle charge point sockets will be needed across Cambridgeshire by 2030, as motorists choose electric vehicles over more polluting petrol and diesel cars. The sale of new petrol and diesel cars is set to be banned by government from 2035. Using up to £5 million in Local Vehicle Infrastructure (LEVI) funding, the council is working with the Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Combined Authority on how to meet this need, with fewer than 500 public charge points currently installed. Officers will develop a plan informed by technical mapping and seek public engagement to find suitable charge point locations. They will report back to the Highways and Transport committee in March, prior to a decision by the Environment and Green Investment Committee later in 2024.

Civil parking enforcement starts in South Cambridgeshire

New Civil Parking Enforcement powers are now in effect across South Cambridgeshire following a decision by Government. Drivers are now far more likely to receive a fine for parking incorrectly where there are restrictions, such as on single or double yellow lines.
